Do not keep it a secret if someone is:

Bullying, threatening you or saying things you do not like or upset you.

Hitting you or hurting you.





Sending unkind or inappropriate messages or photos on the internet or phone.

Touching you in a way you do not like, for example, touching your private parts.



Making you look at things which make you feel uncomfortable, ashamed, guilty, or worried about someone.



Supposed to take care of you but is not.



Trying to give you cigarettes, drugs, or alcohol.

Offering you money or expensive things so that you do something that you know is wrong.





If you need to talk - we will always listen to you:

- ★ You can talk to any adult at school
- ★ It is fine if you need a friend to go with you to tell a member of staff that something is worrying you
- ★ You need to know that there is a team of staff who are trained and responsible for making sure you are safe and well

Staff and Visitors at Milestone Academy

All staff at Leigh Academy Milestone wear a Milestone lanyard with their **name** and **photo** on display

Some <u>staff</u> who are First Aiders wear a <u>green</u> lanyard and those who are Designated Safeguarding Leads wear a <u>purple</u> lanyard

Visitors to the school wear a yellow or a red lanyard, these mean:





The visitor is checked and can walk round the academy by themselves

The visitor has not been checked and MUST be with a member of staff



The staff will only tell what you are worried about to people who can help.

You have the right to feel happy and safe.

It is never your fault if someone is hurting or abusing you.
